Ernest was the seventh child of James and Catherine Foxon and younger brother of Sidney (see previous pages). He was born in Burbage in 1899. Age 18 in 1917, he would have enlisted by this time and served as a sapper with the Royal Engineers.

Ernest was gassed whilst on active service in France. Although Ernest survived the war and returned home, he arrived in Sketchley Road badly suffering from the effects of the gas and was a broken man. Only two years after the 1918 Armistice he died on the 18th November 1920. As part of the criteria established by the memorial committee Ernest's name was rightfully included in the east panel in memory of the men who died from the effects of the Great War.

The pension record card shows that the brothers' mother received a weekly payment of 6 shillings per week on the loss of her son Sidney in 1918. This payment is increased to 13 shillings and sixpence per week following the death of Ernest, money being no recompense for a mother's loss. The Family's other two sons Arthur and James survived the war and his father James lived to be one of the oldest surviving men in the village dying in the 1950's.




Figure 137 Ernest & Siidney Foxon's mothers pension record card.
